Message from the president.

Dear members and supporters of SACIM. It is with great pleasure that we bring to you our first newsletter for 2014. This year we will have to

have some debates regarding the future direction of SACIM. We will need to look at how best we can serve the unfortunate sick children of Mauritius and we will also need to look at ways that we can better invest our funds to improve returns on our investment. As you are all aware with interest rates being at its lowest for decades, the conventional fixed term bank deposit may no longer be the best method of investing our funds.

Over the next few months the committee will be debating our future direction with any proposal to be put to our Annual General Meeting, which will be held in August, for discussion and approval. I sincerely hope to see as many financial members as possible attending our AGM. It is an open forum where you can ask questions and where important decisions are made. So, please try your best to attend. In due course our members will be advised of the

date, time and venue of the AGM.

<u>MEDICAL:-</u>

For a few months now Dr Balakumar, Dr Rajkomar and a team from the Royal Children Hospital have been debating on the merits or otherwise of operating on Victoria Mercier Rouillon, a 15 year old girl who suffers from dorso lumbar scoliosis. Three weeks ago we have been advised that surgical intervention will go ahead. We are awaiting further details, timeline and costs, from the doctors and details about formalities from SACIM Mauritius. We are hoping to see this young girl in Melbourne in June

or July.

We are also in negotiation with SACIM Mauritius regarding the funding of some five children who will be sent to India for cochlear implant. At this stage the committee has agreed to fund some or all the cases depending on costs. We are awaiting more details from SACIM Mauritius.

We are also in talks with our counterparts in Perth who may need some financial assistance from us.

FUND RAISING:

Our annual dinner dance will be held at the Malvern Town Hall on Saturday 12th July. Once again we will be entertained by Ben Sandapa and his group and we will be spoiled with delicious Mauritian food from Jacques La Catering. As the number of tickets will be limited to 300 we would like you to book as early as possible to avoid disappointment.

Very soon we will be sending out raffle books to our members and supporters. We need to sell the 5,000 tickets that will be on sale. Please try your very best to sell as many tickets as you possibly can. Although we try our best to publish two newsletters every year, we have up to date websites and a facebook page, nevertheless some people are not well informed about the on-going good work of SACIM in Australia.

In the past we have had a regular supply of children coming from Mauritius through the SACIM organisation in Mauritius. Of late, with advancement in health science and improved health service delivery in Mauritius, and with other options such as India being cheaper than Australia, we have had difficulty to get children through this channel.

We are in a changing world and as such SACIM is no exception. Twelve years ago, Professor Paddy Dewan, a urology specialist expressed the desire to travel to Mauritius in order, not only, to operate on the children but also to set up and train doctors and others associated in this field. Obviously this attempt was to benefit SACIM financially, but at the same time more children would be able to benefit from this project. Financially this project was not easy to start with.

SACIM Australia eventually provided a sum of money for suture materials and a diathermic machine. Every year SACIM Australia make it a point to invite Paddy Dewan to its annual fund raising dinner dance, so that he is able to tell the Mauritian community of the good work that he does in Mauritius. On this occasion Paddy is presented with a substantial donation in support of his work with the Mauritian children.

On his many visits over the last 11 years Paddy has performed surgical operations on nearly 800 children in Mauritius and more importantly he has established training for a team of local specialists to take over from him and continue his work in the future.

Recently Dr Paulo Selber, a specialist in the orthopaedic field from the Royal Children Hospital has expressed the desire to go to Mauritius in order to share his knowledge and procedures with his counter parts in Mauritius, and if possi-

ble to operate on more difficult cases there. At its meeting held on Saturday 22nd March, the committee of SACIM, after deliberating on a motion presented to it agreed to give full moral support to Dr Selber and support his endeavours for the benefit of Mauritian children.



Extract from the report of Professor Dewan's latest visit to Mauritius

During the 15th visit for the Kind Cuts for Kids program in Mauritius, a project that started in 2001, 160 children were reviewed, 39 had surgery under 40 anaesthetics. This brings the number of clinical episodes in the 14 years to 2479 and the number of surgical treatment events to 799.



As usual, the achievements for the individual patients are not insignificant, but the most important outcome for this visit was the announcement of the undertaking of the reconstruction of a ward at the Neru Hospital for the accommodation of the Paediatric Surgical Unit.



Mauritius is now poised to have a sustainable world class Paediatric Surgical service, the future of which depends on developing the infrastructure, supporting of the staff now in place, and the promotion of the subspecialisation of Paediatrics,

Radiology and Anaesthesia. Service to the community will require three surgeons, but in order for the standard of care for complex cases to be maintained, the surgeons should be involved in outreach to communities with large populations, which could come about by the Mauritian surgeons being enabled (and expected) to assist the work of Kind cuts for Kids.

It is essential that any manpower decisions for Paediatric Surgery are considered in light of that which is already in place, and itinerant, *ad hoc* arrangements by private hospitals in Mauritius and with Surgeons from multiple countries, without due consideration to longer term goals, will put achievements thus far obtained at risk. And, it is vital that there is a designated hospital, ward and support for a Paediatric Surgery Unit that is then underpinned by collaborative, thoughtful planning into the future.





A significant difference to previous Kind cuts for Kids visits was the number of surgeries and consultations that were conducted by the Mauritian Surgeon and the 2nd member of the visiting team, Dr John Lazarus, a Paediatric Urologist from the Red Cross Children's Hospital in Cape Town. Of the 61 operations, for 22, Professor Dewan was the primary surgeon, Dr Teeroovengadum was the primary surgeon for 24 of the procedures and the remaining 15, Dr Lazarus was the principle surgeon; several operations involved Dr Lazarus assisting Dr Teeoengardum, while Professor Dewan attended to other aspects of the visit.

Included in the teaching were lectures given on three different occasions;

- Common Paediatric Urology Professor John Lazarus
- Lessons from Mauritius perineal body reconstruction – Professor Paddy Dewan.
- Legal argument and Medical Ethics Professor Dewan
- Mauritian Paediatric Surgery 2001 to 2013 Professor Paddy Dewan

Each of the lectures was well attended, with well over 250 people being present between each of the three occasions at which the lectures were given. The newly developed continuing medical education program has obviously improved the participation and subsequent patient benefits of


