Farewell to Jacques (Jimmy) Walter, 1944-2010.

Sunday morning 12th of December 2010 and the phone rang just before 6am in the morning. I knew that this would be important, and when I answered and heard Guillemette's weak voice on the other end, I already knew that the news about Jimmy would not be so good. I just spoke to Guillemette on Saturday afternoon to find out what would be an appropriate time to see Jimmy on Monday morning.

It all happened very quickly. Jimmy had been fighting colon cancer for the past 3 years, and after surgery had been managing his chemo treatments with a lot of courage. Every time we saw him he was full of courage, inspiration and motivation – so much so that we all thought that he was winning the fight. As the SACIM Australia treasurer he attended all the monthly meeting during that period, and as usual he was always in control with his financial reports and investment advice. He was there at the October function and he knew that it would be his last one. In the past few months Jimmy had been advised that his chemo treatment had not been successful and that the cancer had unfortunately spread. I visited him a few times over the past few weeks and knowing that he was in the terminal phase, he had organized for palliative care at home. When we last spoke he had accepted his fate and was in control, in spite of the suffering and discomfort.

Having known Jimmy for over 55 years, I personally solicited his assistance a few years ago as SACIM President when I required a Treasurer - he immediately accepted and his contribution to the organization over the past 6 years has been priceless. He was knowledgeable, a very hard and consistent worker, and above all a very good "moderator" who always brought the committee grand strategies to plans that were acceptable and achievable. Jimmy had a long career with the ANZ Bank prior to his retirement and SACIM has benefited from his experience.

All of you will have read Jimmy's SACIM Newsletter articles on Page 6 over the past few years - they were informative about all the financial decisions that were being taken, and about the accurate reporting of the status. For all of us who have followed the SACIM changes in the recent years, we would have followed the systematic and step by step activities that limmy implemented to evolve the constitution to what it is today. This was by far his greatest contribution to the organization and as a result SACIM has been formally positioned to be ready to face the future mission. AGMs, amended required, and eventually adopted and formalised. Such an achievement required constant application and hard work over two whole years, in addition to the day to day activities of Treasurer. We thank you for this great contribution limmy.

Jimmy was a quiet motivator to all of us. He was not keen to assume the more visible leadership role, but was quite happy to do the hard background work that keep things moving. At the last AGM he stepped down from the Treasurer's position, but stayed on the committee to ensure that the processes that he established would continue beyond his own time in the role. Gilbert visited limmy a couple of days ago and limmy handed him three envelopes with information and instructions for the President, Treasurer and Secretary to complete and close all his action items outstanding from the last committee meeting. He had taken the time to hand write the names and addresses on the envelopes, and included a 55c stamp on each to ensure that they reach the recipients. He knew then that he would not be around for much longer, but still felt the urge to quietly drive issues to conclusion.

SACIM conveys its sincere condolences to Guillemette, Stephen, Trevor and Christopher and their families. Thank you for having supported Jimmy behind the scenes while he was devoting valuable time to SACIM.



Mauritius

11th Paediatric Urology/Surgery Teaching Program 29th September - 10th October 2010

Mauritius has been part of the Kind Cuts for Kids Foundation program since 2001, the recent visit being the IIth. Seventy patients were seen in a clinic on the first day, and a second clinic was held on the Saturday; a further small number of patients were seen in the ward, resulting in a total of 140 consultations as part of the program. The most important aspect of this visit For Mauritius to have a sustainable Paediatric Surgical was the high proportion of the surgery that was performed by Dr Kevin Teerovengardum, and the success of the Mauritian Anaesthetic support. The total number of patients treated in the 10 years exceeds 450, with over 1200 consultations and 500 anaesthetics.

In particular he noted that he did not need to use Australian anaesthetists or theatre nurses as now those he worked with were local and amongst the best in the world in their particular field.

During his last visit he and his team conducted 140 consultations, with families camping out for hours to ensure that they were seen by the team. Over all the team has conducted 368 operations in Mauritius and held 1,137 consultations, contacts with families and contact and training sessions. This is a remarkable achievement and one that surely needs the highest recognition from all quarters.

Professor Paddy also spoke of the life changing work "Kind Cuts for Kids" does in paediatric medicine and many attendees purchased fluffy Australian children's toys to raise money for this great organisation.

In all the SACIM Dinner Dance was a great success in terms of variety in food, music and entertainment and everyone present knew that they had had a great time supporting a very worthwhile cause.

Hervé Rochecouste by Fritz Herry

Our immediate past president

We were very fortunate in having Herve Rochecouste as one of our past president. Obviously he had all the requirements to lead SACIM. He came from a family who was most dedicated to that cause, in fact, his father; Raymond Rochecouste was one of the founders and past president of SACIM. By his ability, knowledge and dedication put SACIM on solid foundations. It is obvious that Herve was brought up in the right environment. At an early age he has seen his parents, Raymond and Daisy, who were not only members of the committee, but were also foster parents to the SACIM children who came to Australia for open heart surgery. He has seen firsthand how to come to the help of poor, suffering children who were unable to have sufficient treatment in Mauritius and had to come to Australia for their treatment, and most of them went back home in perfect health.

I am sure that while growing up, Herve had always in his mind to work for SACIM. As an expert in the field of electronics and the head of a company he roamed over Australia and other parts of the world to share his knowledge and expertise. In spite of his busy schedule, in the end he decided that it was time to come to the help of SACIM. We badly needed people of his calibre to keep SACIM going.

In 2001, Herve joined the organising committee. In 2002, as the organisation was being registered, we needed a competent treasurer with computer knowledge. This was the birth of the computer age for SACIM. Herve, a computer whiz, had all the data of the finance computerized and readily available at any time. He also saw the birth of our newsletter in the form that we have it today with all the colourful and technical presentation that was welcomed by our members.

There was much more to be done for SACIM, and the office of Vice-President became vacant in 2004, Herve stepped in. Then onwards he familiarised himself with the admission of children at the Royal Children Hospital and worked in close contact with the specialists.

The following year, 2005, the office of President became vacant. In spite of all his commitments and his travels interstate for his company he took over the job of President.

Under Herve's Presidency SACIM took a new direction. He strove very hard to make SACIM (Victoria) becoming SACIM (Australia), that is,

that we would take responsibility to further the work of SACIM throughout Australia and to provide financial support, not only to SACIM children but to other needy children from Mauritius.

During his tenure of office which lasted three years, Herve went to Mauritius at a crucial time when the SACIM organization was about to be dissolved. Through his diplomacy and team knowledge he was able to persuade some people of the committee of SACIM (Mauritius) to keep the organization going. He was very successful in his mission and today SACIM is much indebted to him.

Herve must have left the committee with a heavy heart, knowing that there is still a lot of work to be done. It is indeed a great loss to our committee. I understand that he is now a member of the committee of "Kind Cuts for Kids", which is headed by Professor Paddy Dewan. On behalf of the committee and on my behalf, we wish him the best of luck in his future prospects.

On the 16th October, Hervé was presented with a plaque in recognition of his long and dedicated service to the charity.

About SACIM (Australia) Inc. SACIM (Aust) Inc. is a volunteer charitable organization that started in Australia in 1973 to provide critical operations in Australian Hospitals to children inoperable in Mauritius. The organization is affiliated to SACIM in Mauritius who identifies the cases and prepares the children to be sent to several countries. In Australia the role of SACIM is to establish contact with hospitals and professional medical personnel, welcome the children, provide foster parenting during their stays, admit them to hospital, visit and comfort them during their stressful time here and them to hospital, visit and comfort them during their stressful time here and the stressful time here. care for them until they can go back home. This assistance is all provided by volunteers.

Some of the medical and professional services are voluntarily provided but there are some costs that cannot be waived. Depending on the case, the costs can vary between \$10,000 and & \$50,000. Those costs are paid by funds raised by SACIM supporters throughout Australia. Over the past 37 years SACIM has cared for 280 children from Mauritius in Australia.

More recently SACIM in Australia has been able to sponsor Specialist Doctors from Australia to travel to Mauritius to perform operations locally there. In most cases this has proved a more effective
