### President's Message Gilbert Clark



Hoping this newsletter finds you all in good health and spirit and ready to tackle another new year, financial year that is.

We at SACIM Australia continue to strive to find support for a few of the less fortunate children of Mauritius.

As reported in our previous newsletter and talked about at our May dinner dance, *Bhavna* has been referred to us by SACIM Mauritius for corrective surgery of a severe deformity of the spine which has been progressing since the age of 10. The road has been long and arduous but hopefully Bhavna will soon find the relief we have been charged to source for her wellbeing.

Enquiries underway centres on her receiving surgical correction at the Epworth hospital under the expert hands of *Dr Michael Johnson*, a specialist in thoracic and spinal surgery and his supporting team. There has been extensive correspondence amongst all parties in Australia and Mauritius in preparation of any possible treatment here.

The medical team here has been anxious to have the maximum amount of tests performed in Mauritius to 1] save on costs and 2] ensure that Bhavna only comes to Australia after it has been determined that corrective surgery is advisable with a high prospect of success.

The risks associated with this particular surgery are understandably high and all must ensure that irrespective of outcome the interest and subsequent wellbeing of Bhavna is always prominent. Although far from certainty, recent discussions with the Dr Johnson, *Dr Caldercott* and the Epworth have been encouraging.

If and when Bhavna reaches Melbourne, the expected lengthy stay here could stretch our foster care resources. So, if there are those amongst our members willing to assist with foster parenting during this special time for Bhavna, please make yourself known to any member of the committee and we will be sure to call on you. I anticipate she will be alone, lonely and likely to be very apprehensive. For the faithful, your prayers will not go amiss. When appropriate, hospital visits will likely help her in the recovery process.

So, more than just your money, Bhavna will need also need your moral support. Please be there for her.

Also, we continue to monitor the progress of *Alizée Dromart*. For those unaware, she has had a rather difficult time on her return to Mauritius late last year. More operations, more stress and demand on her body and also more stress for her parents. They, however stressed, by the grace of God continue to be by her side. Again for those of the faith, your prayers for Alizée and her parents will not go astray. *Jean-Francois* and *Joëlle* continue to appraise us of Alizée's journey.

In May, SACIM held its bi-annual dinner dance at the Carwatha College community centre. Overall

we had a successful fundraising. I will not steal *Jimmy Walter's* thunder but encourage you to read our treasurer's report on the finances of this benevolent and worthwhile society for aid to children inoperable in Mauritius.

Carmel Lucas, no stranger to our functions, was caught unaware on camera putting her thoughts down on paper. Carmel has penned an interesting and refreshing article about that function; a fresh approach with fresh eyes. Thank you very much Carmel

In *Cyril Tuyau* we have discovered another new talent. His skills as an auctioneer is second to none. That was his first we are told. He must be telling fibs. Extracting those bids from an audience already relieved of some significant dollars by just being there was a great coup. The spirit in which the bidders participated was just as good. Thank you and congratulations Cyril. Thank you to all the bidders who help made it fun and the successful bidder.

This society needs its volunteers to carry on the work of its predecessors. Just when we thought our relevance diminishing, there has been a resurgence in cases being referred to Australia. At our last meeting, we had the pleasure and good fortune of admitting at the round table, Monique Mallié from COMMSSA Perth. So far this year they have received three patients. Although we have had one serious referral only, Bhavna, the unofficial quote is close to 50% of our funds. Ashlay Fokeer last year, had he come to Australia would have cost around \$50,000. Kritibye Cahanoo, a case of arthrogryposis earlier this year was withdrawn and referred to an Apollo hospital in India by the Mauritius Department of Health. SACIM is as relevant today as it was 37 years ago. Even if few, the cases being referred are at a level of expertise and equipment not yet available in Mauritius. And before you ask, our illustrious Professor Paddy Dewan cannot do it all by himself. He saw over 169 patients in his two weeks in Mauritius last November.

This brings me to urge you to renew your SACIM membership regularly and also to encourage your friends and relatives to do the same. \$25 per year is really not that hard. I like to think this work is worth doing and that despite whatever hardship we may face from time to time we must forge ahead. We donate to some many good causes in this great new country of ours. A little bit back to the old country cannot hurt, specially when we are talking about children.

I thank you all for the successes of our fundraising dinner dances and urge you to continue your support. Special thanks to our sponsors and prize donors. Our next dinner dance will be at the Malvern Town hall and is attracting a lot of interest already. Be ready, be early to book.

#### In Memoriam—Pierre Rochecouste Hervé



with cancer. Pierre was well known to all of us for having established SACIM NSW in Sydney in the early 80s, and being at the helm of the organization there for around 15 years. SACIM NSW ceased its operation in the late 90s, and in that time they received and treated 62 chil-

dren from Mauritius. This is quite an achievement, considering that the total number of children cared for by SACIM in Australia has been 280, and that those treated in Perth, Adelaide and Melbourne were over a longer period than 15 years. (Perth & Melbourne still operational).

I have been very close to Pierre for over 60 years and I was fortunate enough to have been able to see him in Sydney quite often over the years, and also in the past two years. I was there with him for the last days and I can say that until the end he was always confident that he would pull through and continue his hard work. In the last two months the pain was too much and Pierre eventually knew that he would not win the fight. His contribution to his work, family and social environments were so great that we can all be confident that Pierre will be with us for many more years.

Ever since our very young days in Mauritius Pierre was the organizer, the motivator and leader for initiatives that kept us involved and following by example. Family events, boy scouts groups, social outings, church choirs or just a group of friends going out to dinner, Pierre was always the head strategist, leader and organizer. He was well known for his generosity, hard work and ability to motivate others to follow. It is therefore not surprising that he continued his dedication in Sydney after he settled there in 1967. Pierre's outstanding life contribution in Sydney not only included his SACIM work, but also support and assistance to our large family of Mauritian expaduring the 43 years that he spent in Sydney Pierre became the most well know Mauritian expat through the work that he did in the community.

To his family and close friends, Pierre was mostly known for his continuous sense of humour. There was never any breaks between his jokes and in all parties he was always surrounded by a large group of people bursting out in loud laughing fits from time to time. Sometimes it charitable work for the very under-privileged. The same often life itself.

On Monday 28th June 2010 can be said of the amount of support that he provided to we lost a good SACIM close family and friends when they were going through friend—Pierre Rochecouste difficult times. Most of the 62 SACIM cases that had critipassed away early in the cal surgery in Sydney would not be with us today if it was morning after a two year fight not for the dedication of Pierre to the cause.

> SACIM NSW was known for their ability to raise funds by holding well organized and managed formal functions. During their years of operation they were able to make quite large donations to several hospitals in Sydney who cared for the children. They also had a good network of foster parents to provide a family environment to the children during their stay in Sydney. In the photo below we can see Pierre making a large donation to the Prince of Wales Children's' Hospital. In today's dollars such a donation would be the equivalent of \$75,000.



When SACIM NSW ceased operation they had unused funds of \$22,000 that were donated to SACIM VIC. Around the same time we evolved our constitution to be known as SACIM Australia and extended out fundraising work to Sydney. The funds provided by SACIM NSW were used in 2008 to support the treatment of Emmeline Etienne at the Westmead Hospital in Sydney. Pierre contriates in Sydney. In fact, I will not hesitate to say that tinued his work for SACIM Australia by selling around 100 raffle books in Sydney every year—this in itself has been an outstanding performance considering that we only sell 500 books every year, i.e., 20% of those have been sold by one person for the past 9 years! Thanks to this work we have had several winners in Sydney, including the first prize winner in 2007.

We will remember Pierre for his outstanding work, generosity, integrity and sense of humour. #### Keeping in touch with the Kind Cuts for Kids Foundation

SACIM Australia has been making donations to the Kind Cuts For Kids (KCfK) Foundation for the past few years in order to support their medical missions to Mauritius and elsewhere. The KCfK completed a 2 week mission in Gaza where Professor David Croaker of the ANU Medical School, and 2 medical support personnel from the Canberra Hospital have performed 120 consultations and 35 operations. The team also delivered training to several paediatric surgeons while in Gaza.

Professor Paddy Dewan will be travelling to Bangladesh to visit the BSMMU University Paediatric Surgical Department in the last week of July 2010. The expected outcome will be the education of Paediatric Surgeons and Urologists, through roughly 40 patients, 20 surgeries and 3 lectures. The hospital now has a dedicated Paediatric Surgical theatre. KCfK medical missions are being planned for Columbia and Ethiopia later this year. SACIM Australia is proud of the fact that the "Mauritius Model" that was developed and optimised through 10 KCfK missions to Mauritius is now being applied successfully to assist children elsewhere around the world. The Mauritian community and their friends welcomed the opportunity to enjoy fine food and good music and this event came up trumps in both areas. No doubt the organising committee deliberated long and hard to ensure that both were available on the same night. Congratulations to them one and all!

One can't help being in awe of the work that *Professor Paddy Dewan* and his team does to ensure that, slowly but surely, Mauritian medical professionals are acquiring the skills necessary to allow more patients, especially those with renal conditions, to be successfully treated in Mauritius. What a magnificent

From an outsider's point of view, I see his work as central to what motivates people to support the many fundraising events held by SACIM. His passion for healing is but one facet of his talents and the attendees were treated to some beautifully descriptive stanzas from his poems, entitled "Radiant Smiles", "and "Tears of Gratitude" a highlight of the evening and a poetic summing up of why SACIM and their supporters do what they do. How could they not?

Paddy has just returned from his 10th working visit to Mauritius where he and his team saw 162 patients, performed 63 operations and administered 39 anaesthetics. The quick turnaround of patients who were able to return home, usually a day after surgery, was achieved due to Paddy's skilled and innovative operating techniques. A source of amazement for the very skilled Mauritian doctors he was working with.

Paddy believes that he is doing himself out of a job, but in the next breath reports on his pioneering work in Madagascar and mainland Africa. "Chasing Rainbows" is certainly an appropriate title for his final poetry reading, because of the rainbow's significance as a sign of hope for all people but very especially for the Mauritian people. Hope is at the heart of his work and that of SACIM.

Some serious fund raising followed with the drawing of the raffle, no one won anything on our table this time, and one lucky lady won two prizes. (I think she needs to invest in a lottery ticket. (They say that such events go in threes!)

SACIM always have great raffle prizes thanks to the generosity of their many sponsors and it's a nice touch that they invite the sponsors to present their own prizes. Congratulations to all the winners!

#### Treasurer's Report — Financial Position at 31 May 2010 Jimmy Walter



During the eleven month period ended 31 May 2010 SACIM's core fund raising activities have continued with some success and have included the yearly raffle drawn in October 2009, the October 2009 dance and the May 2010 dance. Income received from our interest bearing deposits also remains a very important source of revenue. Overall, our main revenue streams for the first eleven months of the 2010 financial year were as follows:

October 2009 Raffle	\$8,654 (net)
October 2009 Dance	\$4,762 (net)
May 2010 Dance	\$4,941 (net) *
Investment Income	\$4,740
Donation	\$1,412
Membership Fees	\$1,085

\* Does not include sale of ticket proceeds of \$1,000 received in early June. Taking this late receipt into account net revenue for the dance to be included in the yearly financial statements is \$5,941.

Total gross revenue for the period amounted to \$42,300 and the SACIM's Management Committee is pleased with this performance considering the tight monetary conditions that have prevailed. The raffle remains our most successful fund raising activity with \$9,324 of tickets sold, offset by a minimal expense of \$670. Unfortunately, the maximum amount we are authorized to offer for sale is \$10,000 under existing legislation without special dispensation. Gross ticket sales for the October dance amounted to \$12,600 (280 tickets) with associated expenses of \$7,838 leaving us with net revenue of \$4,762. Total ticket sales for the May 2010 dance were \$12,550 (251 tickets); this was supplemented with the night's raffle and auction which raised an additional \$1,655. Therefore, gross revenue for the dance was \$14,205 which was offset by expenses of \$8,264 to give us net revenue of \$5,941. One area of weakness where some special effort will be required in the future is Membership Fees which continue to decrease not only as a proportion of

During the eleven month period ended 31 total revenue but also in absolute terms. In this regard, I urge May 2010 SACIM's core fund raising activities all members to encourage their relatives and friends to become have continued with some success and have SACIM members and, thereby, contribute to a very worthwhile included the yearly raffle drawn in October cause.

On the other hand, total gross expenses for the same period totalled \$50,300, exceeding gross revenue by some \$8,000. This funding deficiency is reflected in a similar reduction in our deposit balances. Our biggest expenses by far were medical expenses totalling \$30,150; the main two items were:

- \$20,000 to provide for potential medical and related expenses which SACIM may incur in relation to Alizée Dromart. Details of that case and rationale for this provision were outlined in our December 2009 Newsletter. So far \$7,311 of that provision has been used leaving \$12,689 available to meet future claims.
- \$10,000 to fund Professor Paddy Dewan mission in Mauritius.

As mentioned earlier, expenses of \$7,838 and \$8,264 were incurred in relation to the October 2009 and May 2010 dances, respectively. Another significant item was administrative expenses of \$2,691 (mainly, printing & posting of Newsletters and various notices to members).

Despite the reduction of about \$8,000 in our bank deposits SACIM's financial position remains strong with net assets as 31 May 2010 amounting to \$193,070 (gross assets of \$205,759 less medical provision of \$12,689 for *Alizée Dromart*). Gross assets are made up as follows:

I do not anticipate any significant change to this financial position during the last month of this financial year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have contributed to our fund raising activities and urge them to continue with their efforts in the future.

About SACIM (Australia) Inc. SACIM (Aust) Inc. is a volunteer charitable organization that started in Australia in 1973 to provide critical operations in Australian Hospitals to children inoperable in Mauritius. The organization is affiliated to SACIM in Mauritius who identifies the cases and prepares the children to be sent to several countries. In Australia the role of SACIM is to establish contact with hospitals and professional medical personnel, welcome the children, provide foster parenting during their stays, admit them to hospital, visit and comfort them during their stressful time here and care for them until they can go back home. This assistance is all provided by volunteers.

Some of the medical and professional services are voluntarily provided but there are some costs that cannot be waived. Depending on the case, the costs can vary between \$10,000 and & \$50,000. Those costs are paid by funds raised by SACIM supporters throughout Australia. Over the past 37 years SACIM has cared for 280 children from Mauritius in Australia.

More recently SACIM in Australia has been able to sponsor Specialist Doctors from Australia to travel to Mauritius to perform operations locally there. In most cases this has proved a more effective
